# **Matching Concept**

#### **Definition**

Matching involves identifying two or more things that are the same, suitably paired, or that are used together.

### Why Is Matching Important?

Matching is a fundamental educational skill that helps children develop:

- Visual memory
- Short-term memory

Matching games often involve strategy, helping children to develop their problem-solving and analytical thinking skills while building general knowledge.

#### **Prerequisites**

Prerequisites for matching games vary by game design. For the VoiceOver Playgrounds matching activities, children should be familiar with:

- 1-Finger Tap
- Drag and Split Tap
- Spatial Awareness (Corners)

## **How Does VoiceOver Announce Matching?**

 VoiceOver announces the item that has the focus, but there is no specific announcement for matching.

### **Navigating Matching Activities**

• Navigation methods depend on the specific game design.

#### **Earcon**

• A "click" sound plays when navigating to an item on the screen.

#### **Lesson 4: Matching Activity**

- Goals:
  - o Learn to match sound effects to their corresponding jobs.
  - o Reinforce corner navigation and split tapping.
- Screen Layout: Four icons are positioned in the corners of the screen.
  - Fire truck Top left corner
  - Car Top right corner
  - o Airplane Bottom left corner
  - o Cash register Bottom right corner
- **Breakdown**: Child is asked to match a type of worker with the sound of the associated tool or item that the worker may use.
  - o Drag to explore the items in the four corners.
  - O Drag a finger to the top left corner and split tap on the sound a fire fighter might hear (fire truck).
  - O Drag to the bottom right to find a sound that a cashier might hear (cash register).
  - O Drag to the bottom left to find a sound that a pilot might hear (plane).
  - O Drag to the top right to find the sound a mechanic might hear (car).

This structured approach helps children improve listening, memory, spatial awareness, matching and strengthen problem-solving skills while practicing the drag and split tap gesture.
